The goal for the event was to give our local crews a chance to run their cars in a non-competitive environment, and seven drivers/cars took this opportunity.

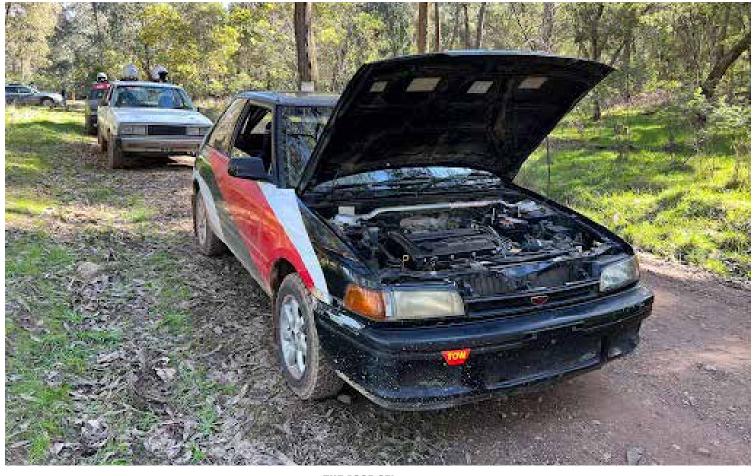

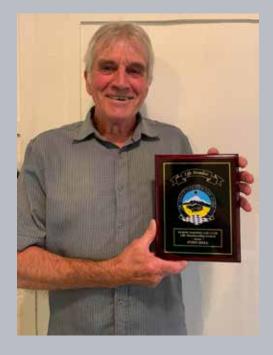
Housekeeping

Our Special Car – Ross and Chris Runnalls

While cycling through the back streets of Porepunkah in late 2021, my wife Chris spotted a cute little ute in a paddock with a for sale sign on it. Discovering that it was a Datsun, she thought it would make a nice restoration project for me. Rob Neilson, a club member and noted old Datsun guru, came along for an inspection and approved its purchase.

Rob has overseen and been a great assistance in the complete dismantling and re-assembly of the 1964 Datsun 320 utility over a 15-month period.

It was decided to avoid the considerable expense involved in restoring the bodywork and retain the worn patina of the bodywork exterior. Some bodywork was required to reinforce the hinges on the driver's door to close properly. This has disturbed the original patina in that area.

The car was stripped down and the chassis sandblasted and re-painted with rustguard paint. Same with the tub underside.

The rather sad A15 1500cc engine, which had replaced the original E1 1200cc engine, was completely rebuilt. The 4.8:1 diff was swapped with a less truck-like 4.1:1 version. In order to utilise a more contemporary Hitachi distributor, rather than the original Lucas side cap version, the column gear shift linkages were dispensed with and a floor change Datsun 1600 gearbox was installed.

While the brake drums could not be replaced, they were machined, and new brake shoes, wheel cylinders and adjusters were obtained.

Front torsion bars and rear springs were retained, but new shock absorbers were found.

Steering arms and ball joints could not be renewed, but a new kingpin set was found on the internet from Cypress. Terry Goode kindly assisted in aligning the ancient-style front end.

We just made it to the February Show Us Your Car Night, but fuel blockage issues meant we did not make it home under our own steam. A more thorough cleanout of the fuel tank has fixed that.

Some new inertia reel seat belts have been installed, making for a more secure feeling in the tiny cabin.

It rides a little rough, so the tough old rally tyres, obtained in an exchange

deal for firewood with Dinta (Officer), have been replaced with some more supple new road tyres. Might look at removing a couple of leaves from the rear springs, as the heaviest load is expected to be only horse feed.

The rattling windows have been ad-

dressed with new Bailey channel rubbers.

A new laminated windscreen was sourced from Queensland but is slightly larger than the original zone toughened screen. Not sure whether to conduct surgery on the new windscreen rubber to accommodate a larger screen, or try and grind 5mm off the edge of the new screen, without stuffing it completely.

It was decided to not seek club rego, but go with a personalised number plate; IFK 320, paying homage to another Datsun, IFK 250, which we have fond memories of, and the 320 models.

COROWA CRUISE

What better way to spend a cold winter Sunday than motoring through the North East?

Participants gathered in Apex Park in Wang about 9.30 am and headed off around 10 am. Of the 25 vehicles, 6 were NECC, 7 were Benalla Auto Club and the remainder were mainly from Wang. The Benalla people were looking for a Sunday drive (apparently BAC isn't offering much in that regard at the moment) and the other Wang people are part of the street cruise Facebook page.





The first port of call was Corowa to visit Max's Motor Museum. John had prepared a rough mud map to direct people to the museum once in Corowa. Most people (including Kathy and me) missed the first turn down a dirt road (hence the term mud map) and proceeded to find their own way to the museum.

Fortunately, nobody got lost so no search party was needed. I suspect Google Maps may have helped some. (Note: don't rely on Belly for directions).

The museum was originated by Max MacLean, a local builder and owner of Max MacLean's Hardware store. Quite a few years ago Max built a number of large warehouses in the Corowa industrial estate. Max set up one of the warehouses to display his and his extended family's car collections.

Club member Rob Neilson (Max's nephew) has some of his vehicles on display. The number of vehicles on display has also been bolstered by other

locals also providing cars for display.

Max passed away a few years ago and the museum is now managed by Max's son Ross, daughter Helen and nephew Rob, and provides tours on appointment to interested groups such as our club. Ross, Helen and Rob were on hand to welcome us to the museum on Sunday.

The displays include cars and commercial vehicles and motoring-related exhibits from the very early 1900s through to around the 1980s. One interesting working exhibit is a Rolls Royce V12 Meteor motor (similar to a Spitfire) mounted on a portable stand. When fired up this motor provided a lot of interest, plus noise and smoke. After about an hour we left the museum and headed for Rutherglen

Our stop in Rutherglen was to visit the "Caffeine and Machine" café for lunch. The café is located in the old Holden dealership building and as well as good food and coffee, it boasts a significant collection of old motorbikes and associated bits and pieces which proved of great interest to a number of us who are into motorbikes as well as cars.

The food and company were good and most people settled in for a chat and coffee. There just happened to be a motorbike club from over Shepparton way also visiting the café and a few of us had a good chat to them. They were conducting a raffle for charity, so some





of our group obliged and bought tickets.

The raffle was drawn while we were still there and John Bell came away with a big umbrella embossed with Ford stuff, and I was lucky enough to also have a win, a pretty good quality fishing rod and reel.

At about 1.00 pm our crowd started dispersing with the final few (John, Kathy and me, Richard Mason and his

wife) and a couple of others hanging around until about 2.30 pm.

I think everyone enjoyed the day and a big thanks to John (our club's quiet achiever) for organising it. It was also good to meet and get to know some people with similar interests from other clubs.
